## **Worship will re-open June 7<sup>th</sup>**

I hope you have been finding a way to participate in a worship service these past couple of months. We have worshiped in Philadelphia, Rochelle, Minooka, Arkansas and Iowa!! It is finally looking like we will be able to start having in-person services soon and the church council has been meeting to discuss what that will look like at PUMC.

First of all, we will be following the recommendations for social distancing and will require the use of a face mask. We have a vulnerable population, and we are taking that very seriously. We will also be asking that everyone uses the front door of the church, unless you need to use the elevator. We want to take the extra steps to keep Pastor Terry safe and healthy. There will be hand sanitizer at the doors and you should use it when entering and when leaving the building. We are changing to a BYOB church (that's Bring Your Own Bible). All hymnals and bibles have been removed from the sanctuary to facilitate cleaning.

Offering plates will not be passed in the pews, they will be located just inside the doors and we ask that you drop your offering as you enter the sanctuary. If you forget, you can give your offering to one of the ushers.

For those who still need to isolate, we are working on having a portion of our service online so you can still be with us at home. We will probably be utilizing Facebook live on the church's Facebook page, and following that up with emailing the video out via email as we did at Easter.

If you have been in contact with someone with a known case of Covid 19, or if you have a cough, chills, or have a fever (please take your temperature at home), please stay home and utilize the online tools.

When you arrive for the service, please wait for the ushers to seat you (sorry, but you may not get "your" spot!!), so that we can ensure safe distancing in the sanctuary. We will be limited to the number of people that can be in the sanctuary, but we will have some space for overflow in the basement. We are also working on video capabilities downstairs. We will not be singing congregational hymns and the service will be a bit different than usual, but we are excited at the prospect of seeing everyone again soon.

The church council would also like to thank you for your faithfulness during this unprecedented time in our lives.

## NEEDS

We continue to collect plastic grocery bags (Jewel, Walmart, etc) and egg cartons. Leave them next to coat rack at the front door.

The Kendall County Food Pantry uses about 1000 bags a week for their food distribution and the receive eggs by the case and need to repackage into cartons.

June's Change for Mission will go to **Imagine No Malaria**. Imagine No Malaria (IMN), a global health program of The United Methodist Church (UMC), combined integrated health infrastructure, education, and advocacy to address death and the debilitating effects of malaria in Sub-Saharan Africa. By doing so, its work has saved lives and loosened the grip of poverty for future generations. The aim was to reach the most at-risk populations, with women and children under five being priorities.

Together we have - provided over 4 million life-saving bed nets  
renovated 61 facilities  
treated over 2.7 million people for malaria  
protected over 175,000 structures with IRS (indoor residual spraying)  
trained thousands of community health workers and volunteers
